The Mission of the Service Departments of the City of Chester is to:



## **Human Resources**

## **Public Works**



Public Works distributed door/ trash bin signs to each household to announce the holiday residential garbage schedule. This notice also reminded resi-

dents of the process in which to dispose of yard debris and curbside junk.

Public Works will collect loose or bagged leaves until March. Due to the needed repairs of the leaf truck, residents are encouraged to bag their leaves for a quicker pick up. **Tires and Electronics should NOT be left on the curbside for pickup.** Public Works does NOT pick up these items. These items are to be taken to the landfill by the owners. **There is one exception to this proce-**

dure. For customer convenience, Public Works has recently established two SPE-CIAL COLLECTION DAYS PER YEAR to pick up tires and electronics (Wednesday, Jan. 16 and Wednesday, June 19). The placement of tires and electronics at the curb on days other than these days will be considered littering and residents may be subject to a fine.

#### FACTS..... Cold Weather Precautions

Cooking and home heating are the leading causes of residential building fires during periods of cold weather. The risk of fires also increases with the use of supplemental heating, such as space heaters. Carbon monoxide (CO) is also a serious threat in cold weather. Any fuel-burning appliances in the home, including furnaces and fireplaces, are a potential CO source. Carbon monoxide is called the "invisible killer" because it is an odorless, colorless and poisonous gas. Smoke and carbon monoxide alarms are an important line of defense in the home, and they give consumers valuable escape time. About two-thirds of fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms or in homes where consumers have removed the alarm's batteries or where the batteries are dead.

Cooking: DO NOT leave cooking unattended. If you must leave, turn off the stove. For a small fire, have an oven mitt and a lid handy that is sized to the largest pan. If a pan catches fire the lid can be slid over the top of the pan and the stove turned off. Be sure to leave the lid on until the pot is completely cool. **Never pick up or move a burning pan**. If your oven catches fire, turn off the oven and keep the oven door closed.

#### Heating:

**Keep** anything that can burn like furniture, window treatments, bedding, clothing, and rugs at least 3 ft. away from furnace or heaters. Be especially careful to keep children and pets away from the heater. Children's clothing can catch fire if they get too close to the heater. **Plug** the heater directly into an outlet. **Shut** off portable heaters when leaving it unattended.

## **Historic Preservation Commission**

The Historic Preservation Commission has jurisdiction to review and approve or disapprove plans for any structure in a historic district or a structure in any district designated as a historic structure in the Zoning ordinance proposed to be constructed, altered, relocated, demolished, partially demolished or proposed to have the exterior architectural character altered. Applications may be obtained from the Chester County Planning Department. Meetings are held on the first Thursday of each month at City Hall. Each member serves a 4 year term.

## EMPLOYEE SHOUT OUT!! Getting to know.... Chief Paul Caldwell



Chief Paul Caldwell was born and raised in Chester, South Carolina. He has lived in Chester his entire life, except for the time spent on campus during his college days. He currently resides in Lowrys with his wife Robyn Caldwell. Together, they have four children: Macy Welborn, Caroline Caldwell, JD Welborn, and Olivia Caldwell. Chief Caldwell is an alumni of the University of South Carolina where he received a Bachelor's Degree, and is a dedicated Gamecock fan. He and his wife are members at Purity Presbyterian Church in Chester, where Paul has served as a Sunday School teacher, youth leader, Deacon and Elder in the church.

Chief Caldwell grew up in and around the Chester Fire Department. His Father, Frank Caldwell III, Grandfather, Frank Caldwell Jr., and two Uncles, Gus and Robert Caldwell were all volunteer firefighters with the Chester Fire Department for many years. He never intended to make a career in the fire service, but did always want to be a volunteer with the department. He became a volunteer with the Chester Fire Department in 1989. He found the fire service to be his true calling in life and began his career officially with the Chester Fire Department as a full time firefighter in 1990.

He left the department in 1997 to become an instructor with the South Carolina Fire Academy. He became the assistant manager of training at the South Carolina Fire Academy and was in charge of the Academy's Recruit Firefighter Training Program. He came back to work in Chester in 2003 to become the Chester County Emergency Management Director, before returning back to the SC Fire Academy in 2004 to become the Curriculum Manager for training programs. In June, 2005, Paul Caldwell accepted the position of Chief with the Chester Fire Department.

#### **Trunk or Treat**




